Student growth and achievement

Student Growth and Achievement refers to the ongoing progress students make in their learning, relative to identified provincial learning outcomes and consistent with their needs, interests and aspirations.

Measures indicate improvements in attendance, achievement, and high school completion. Learners share positive experiences and conditions for success. Learners experience respectful and reciprocal relationships with their school community.

MEASURES AND TARGETS: PROVINCIAL & LOCAL

- Learning Outcomes (PAT & Diploma):
 - Increase in FSD performance results 'At or 'Above' provincial average for Acceptable Standard and Standard of Excellence on grade 6 and 9 provincial achievement tests in Language Arts, Math, Social Studies and Science for self-identified First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students.
 - Increase in FSD performance results 'At or Above' provincial average for Acceptable Standard and Standard of Excellence on Grade 12 diploma exams for self-identified First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students.
- **High School Completion Rate (AEAM):** Increase in percentage of self-identified First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students who completed high school within five years of entering grade 10.
- **Cultural Perspectives Survey:** As part of the Student Intellectual Engagement Survey, we ask all students grades 4-12 their perspectives regarding diverse cultures including but not only First Nations, Métis, and Inuit peoples. This survey is further disaggregated to compare the general population's perspectives with those self-identifying as First Nations, Métis, and Inuit peoples.
- SOS-Q (Student Orientation to School Questionnaire): Increase/maintain in percentage of students who are at or above the National Norm in the areas of Safe and Caring, External Resilience, Internal Resilience, Self-Confidence, Peer Relationships, Utility of School and Extracurricular Activities.
- Student Intellectual Engagement Survey: Increase/maintain percentage of students who chose to agree or strongly agree in 50% of questions in Grades 4 -12 in the areas: High Expectations, Relevance, Rigor, Effort, Lose Track of Time (ELA, Math, Social Studies, Science, CTF/CTS).
- Common Literacy and Numeracy Assessments (4-9): Increase percentage of students who are at or above grade level expectations.

KEY INSIGHTS FROM RESULTS ANALYSIS

Areas of Strength

- Achievement levels on assessments are high to very high
- Students report feeling connected to their peers and having friendships
- Self-identified students report Truth and Reconciliation, learning and sharing cultural experiences and teachers' efforts in these areas

Areas for Growth

- Very large disconnect between the reported achievement levels and student perceptions of their successes
- Results of self-confidence and internal/external resilience are concerning
- Acknowledge effort of the learning as well as the achievement

Next Steps

- Work with Indigenous Elders to support the understanding for developing resilience and confidence for FNMI students
- Increase relevance for learning and high expectations for students
- Meet with students to discuss what would make a difference in learning and their school experiences
