Providing a continuum of student supports to promote Indigenous student success.





TRUTH & RECONCILIACTION

The Board of Trustees begin each Regular Board Meeting with a land acknowledgement, recognizing the space they occupy is on the traditional territories of the Siksika, Piikani, Kainai, Tsuut'ina, and Îyârhe Nakoda and the Metis Nation Region 3.

In the upcoming months, the Trustees will work with Keith Lefthand, an elder in the Stoney-Nakoda First Nation, to develop an authentic and meaningful acknolwledgement of our connection to the land.



TWO-EYED SEEING

As we continue to weave traditional knowledge into our curriculum and operations, we find ourselves using the guiding principal of Two-Eyed Seeing.

Two-Eyed Seeing is learning to use both perspectives of Indigenous knowledge and ways of knowing and Western knowledge and ways of knowing to have a shared vision for the benefit of all. The illustration to the left shows how Knowledge Coexistence leads to decision-making that includes two perspectives.
