March 2, 2022

Meeting with MLAs

The Board of Trustees met with MLAs Sigurdson, Reid and Rosin on March 2, 2022, for an action-oriented discussion around several Foothills School Division priorities including establishing a consistent and open line of communication, the Draft K-6 curriculum, the status of FSD's funding request for the Blackie School's playground, as well as budget challenges around transportation and insurance.

Meeting with Municipal Partners

Following the Board Meeting on February 9, 2022, the Board of Trustees met with the Town of Okotoks sharing productive conversation about the Municipal Development Plan, work being done on the potential new High School Site, and future collaboration around emergency response planning. The Board also expressed its appreciation to the Town for funding a School Resource Officer Program and for allowing Foothills School Division to give voice to the role the officer will play in FSD schools.

On March 1, 2022, the Board of Trustees hosted a positive meeting with Foothills County with both sides expressing appreciation for the very collaborative and solutions-oriented relationship. Discussion throughout the meeting focused on potential developments throughout the County, Joint-Use agreements, and Budget realities - specifically related to FSD's projected \$3.5 million deficit, transportation, and the playground projects in the communities of Blackie and Millarville.
